SONGS AND SCARECROWS ROUND OFF BRATTON WEEK

There are still a couple of days left to enjoy this year's fun and informative Bratton Week, a variety of activities being held in - and about - our lovely village. There has already been music concerts, a cricket match, pub quiz, art classes, a history walk, the WI's pudding night and bell tower tours, to name just a few of the wonderful events. There was even a murder. Sorry, that should say '...even a Murder Mystery Evening'!

Bratton Week 2023 started on June 24th with the Church Fete , which raised more than £2,000; and Bratton Primary School's hugely ambitious Disney themed scarecrow trail which will run until **Sunday 2nd July**. The school's fete is being held in the schoolgrounds on **Saturday 1st July from 12pm-2pm**, along with Party in the Park from **3pm to 5pm**, Folk Music in the Park from **5pm to 7pm** and Party in the Duke from **7pm-11pm** on the same day. Then to round off the week, the Bratton Silver Band holds a Picnic in the Park in aid of Alzheimers Support Music for the Mind on the Village Green on **Sunday 2nd July at 3pm**. WE WIN AGAIN

And talking of things to celebrate...Bratton has once again been crowned Best Kept (Large) Village in West Wiltshire in a competition run by the Council for the Protection of Rural England. The judges felt that the village was beautifully kept and found it difficult to fault any of the areas they inspected. Their report highlighted the Jubilee Hall and Doctor's Surgery as being 'faultless' in their presentation, while the Post Office, village pub and car park; children's play area and Baptist Church were all singled out for praise.

They also loved the transformation of the telephone box as a book exchange and said: "it was obvious that those living in Bratton took great pride in their community". It's a testament to the hard work that everyone puts into their gardens and verges, and congratulations to April and Chris Tarling and all the volunteers of the Tidy Bratton Group.

Now, Bratton is entered into the next round of the competition, to find the Best Kept Village in the whole of Wiltshire which will be judged during July, so keep up the marvellous work!

The groups will do a little further tidying on **Saturday 15th July,** from 10am to 12.30pm, meeting as usual in the Duke Car Park. Everyone is welcome to join this award winning group, just bring gardening gloves. Children are welcome to join in if accompanied by an adult.

CHURCH VIEWS

'And in earth's darkest place, let there be light'

Recreation is a word that we associate with leisure time and holidays. It may involve an activity, like a sport or a special interest. For me, it happens to be golf, but for others it may be gardening, or horse riding. Recreation is something you engage in when you are not working. We do it to refresh and strengthen our minds and spirits, so that we can be happy and effective in our daily lives both at work and during periods of rest.

I find words interesting, and the word recreation comes originally from the term 're-creation'. Re-creation suggests that we become different people when we engage in recreational activities. Such activities help to renew us. This reminds me a lot of the words that St. Paul wrote to the Christians in Corinth about what happens when we live our lives 'in Christ': Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, the new creation has come: The old has gone, the new is here! (2 Corinthians 5.17). Paul is talking about the different life-style that the new Christians in Corinth adopted, rather than a period of rest and relaxation. Where before, they had worshipped pagan gods (the Greek gods), now they were committed to Christian values and worship. And others recognised the change that had taken place: By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you love one another (John 13.35).

Re-creation, then, is an essential, life-changing part of being human. It can help to change our lives to be more in line with the kind of people God wants us to be. It brings refreshment to our lives, when sometimes our daily work can seem boring or tedious. We get to see life in a different way, visiting new places when we go on holiday, enjoying activities that boost our bodies and our spirits.

Too many people today seem to miss out on this. We have become a society where one is expected to work long hours, even answering emails whilst on holiday. And for most of us the retirement age is creeping higher and higher. We need times of recreation to be properly human.

St. Antony, the first Christian monk, was one day relaxing with his disciples when a hunter came by. The hunter was surprised and mildly shocked to see the great saint taking it easy, so he rebuked him. Antony replied to him, saying: 'Bend your bow and shoot an arrow.' And the hunter did so. 'Bend it again and shoot another,' said Antony. And he did, again and again. The hunter finally said, 'Father Antony, if I keep my bow always stretched, it will break.' 'So it is with the monk,' replied Antony. 'If we push ourselves beyond measure we will break; it is right from time to relax our efforts'.

Hedges adjoining public footpaths

Just a reminder if you have a hedge on your property adjoining a public footpath it is your responsibility to ensure the growth of the hedge does not obstruct the path. The Council works hard to ensure the paths are well-maintained and your support by trimming your boundary hedges is much appreciated.

VANDALISM AT THE RECREATION GROUND

Bratton's Recreation Ground on Trowbridge Road is a superb facility available for every villager to use, as well as being the home ground of Bratton Cricket Club, Bratton Football Club and further football and cricket teams. Almost everyone who visits the ground takes good care of it. However there have recently been several cases of minor vandalism, damaging the buildings and equipment which impose repair costs on the Parish Council budget. Please try to discourage this anti-social behaviour if you know the culprits.

And if you see anyone not picking up their dog's mess, please ask them to do so as it could incur a considerable fine as shown on the notices displayed at the entrance to the ground. It is a serious health hazard for anyone using the ground in any way.

WHEELIE GOOD IDEA

If you are struggling to put your wheelie bins out for collection, and then bringing them in again, please do remember that there is assistance available from Wiltshire County Council. KERBSIDE RECYCLING

Wiltshire Councillor Suzanne Wickham writes: Wiltshire Council is working hard to improve kerbside recycling and I thought it may be helpful to highlight some of the recent changes. This system is much better for the environment as more items will be recycled rather than go into the general waste collection. It is important that we only put the right materials in our blue recycling bin. Items such as nappies, film used in food packaging, carrier bags and plant pots, should <u>not</u> be recycled but put into the grey waste bin.

Some new items that can now be collected include batteries and small rechargeable items. Batteries should be placed in a transparent sandwich bag and placed on top of the blue bin. In the first three months of this service 15 tonnes of old batteries have been collected.

Small rechargeable items, such as electric toothbrushes, shavers, vapes, charging devices and mobile phones can be placed in a carrier bag and left beside the blue bin. Various metals can be recovered and reprocessed from these items. Paint pots can now be recycled/disposed of when no longer needed. If you pot is at least half full of paint, you can donate it at the HRC for anyone to collect for free. If you wish to dispose of paint pots, please allow the paint to dry out by leaving the lid off or adding soil or sand, and then taking them to the relevant area at the HRC.

Some items are no longer able to be collected at the kerbside, including shredded paper, which you could either compost at home or take to a Household Recycle Centre (HRC). Textiles will no longer be collected but good quality items should be donated to Charity shops or if not suitable for donation should be taken to an HRC.

Before you visit an HRC, please sort the items that you want to recycle so that it will be easier to put them in the correct skips which are all clearly labelled, such as wood, green waste, electricals etc. Sadly, a third of items that are thrown into the general waste skips could be recycle and this is waste of resources that could be recycled.

EDINGTON MUSIC FESTIVAL

This year will be the 68th Edington Festival, making it the oldest festival of music within the liturgy in the world. It will run from **Sunday 20**th **to Sunday 27**th **August**, with four services a day, three Cathedral and Collegiate choirs, top organists, and friends gathering from all over the world. Everyone taking part is grateful to the Priory Church for inviting them once again.

The theme is 'A Crown of Prayer and Praise', taking its inspiration from the seven-sonnet sequence 'La Corona' by John Donne. This year is the 400th anniversary of the death of William Byrd, so the week includes many of his works, but also pieces by Rachmaninov, Matthew Martin, Herbert Howells, Orlando Gibbons and others. As always, the days are book-ended with Matins and Compline, sung to plainchant by the Schola, and the Wednesday Choral Evensong will be broadcast live on BBC Radio 3.

The Musical Evening and Supper will be on **Wednesday 23rd July**. There is lots of information about the festival on the website *edingtonfestival.org* and don't forget that the festival is not ticketed. All services are free and unreserved.

ALL THE KING'S MEN

Sadly The King's Men concert planned for Edington on **Friday 14**th **July** in the Priory Church has been cancelled. After much deliberation, the Trustees of the Friends of the Priory Church took the hard decision not to go ahead with the event.
