HOUSING DEVELOPMENT TO THE WEST OF THE VILLAGE

An extra-ordinary meeting of Bratton Parish Council was held on 28th September to consider Ashford Homes' planning application to build 31 new residences on land north of Westbury Road and West of Court Orchard. The principle to build and to access from the B3098 having been previously agreed by Wiltshire Council.

The meeting was well attended by over 120 people. Ashford Homes answered all the questions raised about their designs in an open and helpful manner, and these will be recorded in the minutes from the meeting. It is clear that there remain several concerns about the development and the discussions afforded the BPC the opportunity to better gauge what should go into the BPC submission to the planning application. This will be submitted to Wiltshire Council's Planning Department in time for the 3rd October deadline. Anyone wishing to submit their own comments can do so on Wiltshire Council's Planning Portal, meeting the deadline. To do this, use the link on the Parish Website or search: 'Wiltshire development planning application PL/2023/07170'.

HARVEST: NEWS FROM THE RECTOR

With the strange weather we've been having this year – hot in June, wet in July and August and then hot at the beginning of September – it's hardly surprising to hear complaints from farmers about the difficulties of this year's harvest. Having to harvest wheat in between spells of wet weather means extra costs drying the crop afterwards. It's hard to tell how much this is due to global warming. After all, there is plenty of evidence from the past of good years and bad years on the farm.

However, there is plenty of scientific evidence that our climate is changing. It is now warmer than it was a generation ago, and when it rains, it comes down harder. Periods of drought can be followed by times of flooding. Both these make planning the agricultural year more hazardous. There is all the more reason these days to breathe a sigh of relief when the harvest is finally in, and give thanks both to God and to those who work on the land.

There remains the challenge of what to do about climate change. If global temperatures keep rising, and the weather becomes less predictable, then other areas of life as well as agriculture will be affected. Wildlife and nature as we know it will be at risk, the countryside will change, and the way most of us live. It may be that the growing trend of immigration from parts of Africa and the Middle East may be partly due to climate change. We live in a time when, unless we begin to change our lifestyle radically, it will be too late to avoid some of the worst effects of climate change.

It's not surprising that climate change is among the most important issues for the younger generation today. They will have to face up to the long-term consequences of it. Yet we *all* have a responsibility for caring for the future of our planet. We need to make conscious decisions about moving away from burning carbon to run our transport system and to heat our homes and workplaces. It is an issue that all our major political parties need to promote, as it will take considerable time and money to achieve.

Whatever one's feelings about climate change demonstrators or the Ultra Low Emission Zone (ULEZ) in London, climate change must not become a political football for short-term populist gains at the next General Election. Combatting climate change needs a united commitment from each one of us to make a real difference for generations to come. So when, next time, you need to replace your car or your boiler, think about how you can do your bit to help the environment and conserve our farmland and countryside for years to come. Dog Owners

Please remember that dogs are not allowed on the Village Green.

Woods above St James' Church

We are working hard to have a replacement installed but have run into unexpected problems causing delay. We will update as soon as we have further information.

BRATTON NEIGHBOURHOOD PLANNING: CONSULTATION CONTINUES

FINDINGS SO FAR: People value the green spaces and views in and around the village including strong support for areas nominated for exercise and relaxation, which are well used and have mental health benefits;

Support for the nominated heritage assets was overwhelming with a number of new suggestions put forward; our footpath network is valued and there is strong support for a footpath to Fitzroy farm (which is beyond our parish boundary) and a cycle route to Westbury Railway Station was strongly supported.

The strongest theme lay in opposition to the potential development sites; there is, however, support for additional houses; the character of the village is keenly valued and there is concern that new builds could damage it and a number of suggestions to improve it were put forward. The suggestion of a 'Village Trail' was strongly supported. Increased traffic due to new builds, together with speeding drivers and problems parking, particularly in Stradbrook plus the use of Court Lane by HGVs were all issues of concern. More dog poo bins are needed.

Consultations are not over. This is your plan!

The Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group will hold a drop-in session at the Jubilee Hall on 2nd December 10.00 am - 4.00pm. for all residents of the village who would like to hear about progress on the assessment of development sites which were submitted to us earlier this year as we started work on the plan. We would love to hear your thoughts on which, if any, sites you think are the most suitable or, if you have suggestions for how the sites could contribute to the facilities in the village. More details will be shared in the coming weeks.

DO YOU NEED TO CUT YOUR HEDGE?

Wiltshire Councillor Suzanne Wickham writes: hedges alongside footpaths can be a hazard to pedestrians, especially to people who are disabled, visually impaired or to young children who risk injury or damage to their faces or clothing from thorns and branches. If the pavement or footway is narrow or the obstruction is excessive, they may be forced into the road. This is particularly dangerous for wheelchair users or for people pushing a pram or buggy. On junctions and bends overgrown hedges may obstruct sight lines and the clear view of motorists. They can also obscure traffic signs or streetlights and with many of our country lanes being narrow, increase the risk of accidents.

Where hedges grow on the edge of the highway a footpath and mark its boundary with private property, it is the responsibility of the adjacent landowner or occupier to properly maintain them, and any trees or other vegetation the hedge contains. Landowners and occupiers are required by law to trim any hedge next to public highways **where the growth is preventing safe passage**.

Please check hedges on your land bordering the highway regularly and cut them back if they are obstructing visibility or the passage of vehicles or pedestrians along the lanes. Also check vegetation is not obscuring signs or streetlights. If Wiltshire Council, exercising its powers as the Highway Authority, identify an obstructive hedge or potentially dangerous tree on your land, they can send a letter saying what work you need to carry out to make the vegetation safe. If you don't deal with the obstruction, they may do the work and claim back the cost from you.

BRATTON COMMUNITY BRASS BANDS

Members of the band were pleased to attend the National Brass Band Championships to watch the Third Section Finals held in Cheltenham on Sunday 23rd September. The twenty qualifying brass bands performed the music 'The Lost Village of Imber' which was commissioned to mark Bratton Silver Band's 160th Anniversary. This musical composition can be heard at the band's Autumn Concert at Edington Priory Church on **Saturday 28th October 2.30pm.** (Entry is free). The band will also perform 'Imber Variations', a selection of music telling the story of some of the people who lived at Imber and marking the 80th Anniversary of the evacuation of the village. Other programme items will include music from Beethoven's 5th Symphony performed by the Brass Band as well as music from Holst, Esenwald and Philip Sparke.

After a busy summer schedule with many performances, the sounds of Christmas music have been heard coming out of the Church Institute in Bratton where the band rehearse twice a week. The Silver Band have been rehearsing hard and have undertaken the recording of a Christmas CD, 'Jingle Brass' at Edington Priory Church which will be released in the coming weeks.

Back in the summer, the band visited 5 local primary schools to give 'Proms in the Playground' performances to inspire children to learn a brass instrument. This was followed by a very successful Open Day where children could find out more and try out brass instruments. A full cohort of children has been recruited for a Brass Roots group which is starting at the beginning of October.

FROM THE AIR AMBULANCE TO THE HISTORY OF JAZZ with the u3a

John, a volunteer for Wiltshire Air Ambulance, gave a fascinating talk about this much-needed service, that costs £4 million a year (£11,000 per day) to keep operational, with no regular direct funding from the Government or National Lottery - it is supported mainly by public donations. The helicopter is a Bell 429, carrying out the Helicopter Emergency Medical Service (HEMS), with a highly-qualified crew comprising a pilot and two critical care personnel (a Doctor and Paramedic, or two Paramedics). The Mission Map for 2022 shows that 1,061 missions were carried out that year, including 69 in Salisbury, 83 in Bath and 173 in Swindon. Wiltshire and surrounding counties share their air ambulances as required in emergencies. On average, 3 potentially lifesaving missions are carried out each day! As well as essential lifesaving equipment, the Air Ambulance carries 4 units of plasma, 2 units of 0 negative and 2 of 0 positive blood, which the critical care crew are qualified to use for blood transfusions.
