LEST WE FORGET - REMEMBRANCETIDE 2023

The Parish Council arrangements for the commemoration of Armistice Day and Remembrance Sunday are as follows:

Armistice Day – Saturday 11th November. The Royal British Legion Bratton Branch will lead the two-minute silence at the War Memorial at 11am. The Last Post and Reveille will be sounded. The ceremony will take place within the curtilage of the memorial. Participants are asked to find a suitable space in the vicinity taking particular care as the road will not be closed to traffic.

Remembrance Sunday – 12th November. There will be a Remembrance Sunday service in St James's Church at 9:30am at which the Bratton Community Brass bands will play. This is a moving ceremony in our beautiful village church which we hope will be well supported. There is also a service in the Bratton Baptist Church. The Two-minute Silence will be observed at the Village War Memorial at 11am. This will be followed by wreath laying and a short ecumenical service at which the Bratton Community Brass Bands will play. The road will not be officially closed to traffic but the Parish Council will post traffic sentries on the approaches to the Memorial requesting drivers to take an alternative route or stop. Nevertheless, people are asked to take particular care when moving around in the area surrounding the memorial ceremony and to take their places by 10.50am. At the end of the ceremony everyone is invited to coffee in the Baptist Church. All veterans are welcome to join the march from the Church Institute to the War Memorial, you do not have to be a member of the British Legion to take part. Medals may be worn. Lunch is available in The Duke and there will be a curry option on the menu. Book directly with The Duke *01380 830242*.

WHY REMEMBRANCE DAY MATTERS

Andrew Sinclair, Rector writes: The consequences of war are on show on our television screens every day. It is the suffering that we see today that makes our own observance of Armistice Day and Remembrance Sunday more poignant. Those who are old enough to remember the dark days of the Second World War may recall from personal experience the suffering that took place then for the people of this country. Others who are younger must learn from the stories that are told by those who were witnesses. We learn also from the sacrifices made in more recent conflicts by members of our armed forces, in Northern Ireland, the Falklands War, Iraq (twice) and Afghanistan.

This is why Remembrance Sunday is so important. It reminds us of the horrendous cost of war, the lives lost, the bereavements, the wounds both physical and mental which can last for years. War should only be entered into as a last resort, when all other attempts at a peaceful reconciliation have failed. The decision to go to war must also conform to the principles of international law. Russia, in fighting an 'imperialist' war invading Ukraine, has clearly not obeyed these principles. In attacking hospitals and civilian targets Russia is rightly being pursued for committing war crimes. Hamas, in its incursion into Israel, has also broken these principles, as it seeks not only to eradicate Israel, but also is holding civilian hostages illegally.

Our government rightly condemns those who commit crimes against humanity. However, it has to be admitted that our country is not totally blameless. Bloody Sunday is still remembered in Northern Ireland alongside the murders committed by the IRA and other terrorist organisations there. Bringing about peace and reconciliation to people who have been divided by violent conflict continues to be a challenge.

And yet we must continue to commit ourselves to such challenges, because the cost of not doing so is measured in human lives lost. Such a commitment involves everyone involved working towards justice and reconciliation. In Northern Ireland, the barriers dividing communities between Unionists and Nationalists still stand, more than 25 years since the signing of the Good Friday agreement. In Israel and the Palestinian communities of Gaza and the West Bank, a way remains to be found to allow both communities to live at peace with each other. Recent events have only made such reconciliation harder to achieve.

And when we feel helpless in the face of cruelty and inhumanity, sometimes the only thing we can do is to pray. Praying helps to unite us together, and to side particularly with the victims of war and violence. Remembrance Sunday this year is on **12th November**.

POPPY TALK DATES FOR YOUR DIARY

The dates, speakers and subjects for the Poppy Talks in 2024 have been agreed:

Saturday 20th January: Mark Aston, an ex-SAS soldier, will speak about Special Forces in the Falklands War.

Saturday 17th February: Dr Paul Fox, an ex-infantry and Intelligence Corps officer and art historian, will speak about what to do with cultural artefacts acquired on military campaigns during our imperial era?

Saturday 23rd March: Roy Zaman, an ex-cavalry officer, will speak about experiences of a British Army Support Officer in Fiji.

Saturday 20 April: Jonathan Bailey will speak about the Special Operations Executive as a follow-on to his talk earlier this year.

POLICE INVESTIGATE ANONYMOUS 'THREAT' LETTERS

Wiltshire Councillor Suzanne Wickham writes: I recently attended a liaison meeting at Hills Waste Solutions, Northacre Resource Recovery Centre in Westbury, where local Councillors were asked to inform residents of disturbing statements that are being made in anonymous letters that have been received by the company. These letters claim that an organised group of people in the Westbury area are deliberately adding prohibited items, such as batteries and full aerosol cans, into blue lidded recycle bins in order to cause damage to waste treatment infrastructure, and that this action is being taken against, and to influence Northacre Renewable Energy to reverse their decision to build an incinerator in Westbury.

It should be noted that material from blue lidded bins is not taken to Westbury but is processed at the Hills Materials Recycling Facility near Calne, and that household waste from our black bins is treated at the Northacre Resource Recovery Centre where the process results in the production of Solid Recovered Fuel that is shipped to Europe for incineration to generate renewable power.

The danger of the threats made in these anonymous letters cannot be understated. Waste materials are compacted during both transport and processing and the potential for certain materials catching fire or exploding is very real and this is why they are excluded or have other methods of collection. These threats pose both risk of personal injury to recycling collection crews, and damage to collection vehicles and recycling plant and machinery. The police are in possession of these letters and are investigating these threats, but I would urge anyone who is involved in these allegations to consider the serious implications of this action, and the potential risk to life and damage to property.

The income derived from the recycling operation in Wiltshire offsets the cost of waste management in the county, and any adulteration of recyclable material has an economic impact which would affect all of us as Wiltshire council taxpayers. Wiltshire Council encourages recycling for the benefits we are all aware of and that it reduces the requirement to send material to landfill.

Wiltshire Council Household Recycle Centres also facilitate many other types of material that cannot be added to kerbside collections. Residents are encouraged to sort their waste and separate recyclable items at home rather than bringing mixed black bags of waste to the recycling centres. All these measures and facilities help towards Wiltshire Council's aim to become carbon neutral by 2030, and it clearly benefits us all to recycle as much as possible.

ALL THAT JAZZ

Westbury and District U3A thoroughly enjoyed its second visit by Roger Browne who entertained royally with his seemingly endless knowledge of the History of the Jazz Piano. As well as playing his keyboard, Roger explained about types of jazz, such as 12-bar blues, ragtime, boogie-woogie and stride. One of Roger's musical heroes was the famous African-American Scott Joplin, who for some time played his music on the ground floor of a brothel to entice men inside! Sadly, nobody wanted to publish Joplin's work, which caused him not only to be severely depressed between 1900-1904, but also to produce some of his most melancholic, wonderful music. Roger ended with a beautiful rendition of the Hymn to Freedom, named in honour of Martin Luther King, by another of his heroes, and one of the greatest jazz pianists, Oscar Peterson. This hymn became an unofficial anthem of the Civil Rights movement.
