#### THE CHILDREN'S SOCIETY

For the past eight years I have organised a coffee morning for the annual collection and counting of the Children's Society's home collecting boxes. Sadly, this annual event has been affected by coins being replaced by online payments, cards or the mobile phone. Another difficulty is a majority of the local banks are now closed making it very difficult to pay in the money and Post Offices cannot take the cash.

Therefore I have decided to make the next annual collection my final one which will take place in the Spring of 2024. If you would still like to continue to support them the information on how to do this is on their website.

**Christingle Service will be February 4**<sup>th</sup> **2024** - Since the early nineties the Bratton Benefice Support Group (which includes Edington) have collected over £86,000 through many different fund-raising events. Lord Spencer Loch who was living in Bratton House in 1985 suggested we held a Christingle Service at our Family Service in February (close to Candlemas) in St James Church where everyone receives a Christingle orange, and the collection is for The Children's Society, we have done so every year since 1986!

## DO YOU HAVE ANY FOREIGN COINS TO SPARE?

As a result of these collections, I have a quantity of foreign coins and notes which the Children's Society do not collect. However, the Royal National Institute for the Blind have a scheme for collecting these. They will provide a pre-paid box enabling me to forward these coins providing I have more than 3kg in weight. I currently have 2.75 kg! #### **CHURCH VIEWS**

Advent, which this year begins on December  $3^{rd}$ , marks the start of the Christian year – a year that tells a story. We begin with Advent, awaiting the birth of Christ, then make our way through Christmas, Lent, Holy Week, Easter, the Ascension and Pentecost ... until we get to the end of the year, which looks forward to the end of time, the final coming of Christ and the Kingdom of God. We're invited to find ourselves inside this story.

What does it mean to live within this story? It tells us two things: Who we are and what we hope for. First, who we are. One of the ways in which we understand ourselves is by telling stories about ourselves and others. When we come home at the end of the day, we tell stories of what we have done and the people we've seen. We tell stories of our childhood and our friendships, of our holidays and school days – all of these explore and express our identity.

There are other stories that explore the identity we share with larger groups, as members of a family, a community or a nation, as the supporter of a particular football club or a member of a choir. I discover who I am by exploring with others who 'we' are. Each year, through the drama of the Christian year, from Advent when we wait for the birth of Christ, through all the seasons to the feast of Christ the King in November. To live within this story is to express and explore an identity. On one level this identity is that of being a Christian, rather than belonging to another faith or a non-believer.

But the Christian faith is an odd one, because it is not fundamentally about being a Christian but about being *human*. It points us towards a Kingdom in which all of humanity will be reconciled and united. Each year we live through this long story, and it stretches open our little identities, pointing us towards a larger identity, as a member of the whole of humanity in Christ.

The second thing that this story of the Christian year does is to give us hope – hope that one day we may enjoy a better future, free from poverty, disease, disasters both human and natural. So many people today live with despair and depression. Where have our dreams gone in this world of 'cost of living' crises, global pandemic and wars?

In the face of this temptation to despair, what is the hope that the Christian story offers? At the heart of the Christian faith is the story of Jesus' suffering, death and resurrection at Easter. Here is a story of life overcoming the power of death, of good winning out over evil. Without Easter, we would not celebrate Christmas, for Easter is about God leading us through our sufferings to a better place. Christmas marks the time when God comes and lives among us, showing us the way towards Easter.

## YOUR LOCAL COUNCILLOR

I recently attended a meeting with some members of Bratton Parish Council and Wiltshire Council Highways Team, to discuss and clarify roles and responsibilities for all the groups who work towards keeping the village clean, tidy and as safe as possible for pedestrians and road users. This discussion is relevant to all the villages of Ethandune.

You may have seen a Parish Steward in your village, he or she is responsible for specific aspects of general maintenance. Within our villages we are all very lucky to also have wonderful volunteers who arrange litter picking, leaf clearing, cutting back vegetation and generally keeping our villages looking good. This benefits everyone and without this work our communities would be much less pleasant places to live.

At the meeting we discussed the huge task of keeping our verges clear of weeds and drains clear of leaves and other blockages. When you consider the huge County that Wiltshire is, and the vast amount of highway, both urban and rural, you will understand that this is not a task that can only fall to the local authority or volunteer groups to undertake.

You may already have a scheme in your area where you have 'Adopted a drain'. Put simply, if we could all make sure that the drains close to our homes, and where we walk in our villages are clear of leaves and any accumulated debris, excess water would flow better and keep pavements and the surrounding area free of standing water. This also applies to weeds at the edge of the road or pavement, where build-up of weeds can prevent rainwater flowing to the nearest drain.

If you do have a blocked drain that you cannot clear, please report it on the MyWilts App.

If you can't join one of the Community groups in your area, please do consider keeping the verges and drains near to your home clear of fallen leaves and debris. We can all do our bit to help keep the water moving.

Christmas will soon be upon us, and I hope that everyone manages to spend time with loved ones and have a wellearned rest from our usual busy lives.

Please don't hesitate to contact me if there is any local issue that you think I can help with.
