

VC	Character Area: Village Core	
Number	Description	See Key
1	Baptist Church, Carpenters Lane: Built in 1734 and extended in the 18 th and 19 th Centuries	GRADE II* 1036507
2	Gate Piers and Gates, Baptist Church: The entrances from Carpenter's Lane and Bury Lane both have handsome gateways	GRADE II 1364308
3	The Old Manse, Chapel Close: Built as the home of the Baptist Minister by Thomas Parfet 1802	GRADE II 1036508
4	Melbourne House, Melbourne Street: Built by wealthy clothier, William Whittaker, in 1768	GRADE II 1434794
5	Garden Walls, Gate and Piers, Melbourne House, Melbourne Street	1193793
6	War Memorial, Melbourne Street: Gifted to the Village by Mr & Mrs Diggle, it commemorates 25 men from Bratton who died in WWI & II	GRADE II 1434794
7	Bratton House, Melbourne Street: Built by Phillip Ballard circa 1716 and extended 1826 by the Seagram family	GRADE II* 1036520
8	Stables, Bratton House, Melbourne Street: Mid-18 th Century	1193815
9	Front and Side Walls, Gate Piers, Bratton House Melbourne Street	1036521
10	Milestone, outside Reeves Farm, Melbourne Street: Late-18 th Century made of limestone	GRADE II 1193866
11	Tuckers, 1 Melbourne Street: Timber-framed and thatched cottage dated circa 1631	GRADE II 1364274
12	The Old Post Office, Melbourne Street: Built by George Cross circa 1856	2/5
13	Home Guard Hut, Reeves Farm, Emms Lane: Corrugated steel Nissan Hut used to store equipment for drill practice during WWII	1/2/5
14	Tynings House, Tynings Lane: Attractive Edwardian House built for Nelson Reeves between 1904-1910.	2/3/5
15	Bratton Church Institute, Tynings Lane: Built in 1910, this is a lovely example of an Edwardian public building, still at the centre of community life of the Village.	2/3/5/6
16	White Horse Cottages, Tynings Lane: Terrace three of red-brick artisans cottages built 1904 to house workers at Reeves Ironworks.	5/6
17	Telephone Kiosk, Melbourne Street: The K6 style kiosk was designed to commemorate the Silver Jubilee of King George V in 1935. Bratton's example was repurposed in 2023 as a Book Exchange.	4/6
18	Jubilee Hall, Melbourne Street: Built to commemorate Queen Victoria's Golden Jubilee in 1887, extended in 1987, and again in 2002 this public building stands at the centre of community life of the Village.	2/3/4/6
19	Hillcroft Stores, Melbourne Street: An attractive Edwardian building with 1906 date plaque, now the Village Shop and Post Office.	2/6
20	The Duke Inn, Melbourne Street: At the centre of Village life for several Centuries, the pub is thought to date back to at least 1739.	4/6
21	Whale Jaw Bones, The Duke Inn, Melbourne Street: Thought to have been erected in the early 20 th Century to attract tourists to the Inn's Victorian Tea Gardens.	1/3/6
22	Monument to Reeves Ironworks, Melbourne Street: Erected in 1993 to mark the location of Reeves Ironworks (1808-1972, demolished in 1973), this monument includes an Elevator Spur Wheel.	3/6

1	Lower/Old Mill, Lower Road: Thought to be the oldest mill in the Village with parts dating back to circa 1500s	1/2/3/6
2	Portway Farm, Lower Road: 17 th Century Brick and Stone Farmhouse	3/6
3	15, Lower Road: Thatched cottage with date plaque dating back to circa 1700	GRADE II 1036516
4	Mill Vale House, Melbourne Street: Former mill owners house built circa 1778	GRADE II 1193830
5	Old Mill Yard, Melbourne Street: Built by Thomas Jarvis circa 1807 - remains of the mill workings in the stream.	2/6
6	Cornhay Cottage and Shepherds Cottage, 2&4 Stradbrook: 17 th Century timber-framed cottages.	GRADE II 1036522
7	White Cottage, 3 Stradbrook: Late-17 th Century timber-framed cottage	GRADE II 1364275
8	Priory Cottage, 5,7,9 Stradbrook: Late 17 th Century artisan's cottages	GRADE II 1193880
9	Spring Gardens, Stradbrook: Terrace of brick cottages built in 19 th Century to house workers at Reeves Ironworks with considerable townscape value	4/5/6
10	The British School, Stradbrook: Former school built in 1844 (Closed in 1828) for children of non-conformist families.	2/6
11	Emms Farm, Emms Lane: 17 th Century Thatched Farmhouse.	GRADE II 1364309
12	Barn at Emms Farm, Emms Lane: 18 th Century. Timber-framed with hipped thatched roof	GRADE II 1286036
13	1-3 Cleeve Terrace, Stradbrook, The basement remains of the former mill demolished in 1909	2/6
14	6 The Ball: Particularly picturesque thatched cottage at the top of The Ball with important townscape value, built 1733	3/4/6
15	Vale View Cottage, 17 Stradbrook: Attractive brick-built Victorian cottage adjacent to The Ball with important townscape value	4/5/6
16	Wrought-iron Gate, Stradbrook: Used to gain access to the Stradbrook stream for Baptisms while the Methodist Chapel (now demolished) was in operation from 1870-1957	2/6
17	St Catherine's Well (aka Cat's Well/The Spill), Imber Road: Between Stradbrook and Luccombe Terrace, this well, is thought by some to date from the Mediaeval period	2/6
18	Luccombe Mill, Imber Road: Georgian former mill owners house, built Circa 1822 with a particularly picturesque former Mill Pond.	2/3/4/6


2C	Village Character Area: 20 th Century Housing Developments	
Number	Description	See Key
1	Manor Farm House, Court Lane: Listed mid-17 th Century farmhouse	GRADE II 1193540
2	Turnpike Cottage, Westbury Road: Built by the Turnpike Trust around the turn of the 18 th Century to house the toll-keeper.	4/6
3	King George V 'Wall' Post Box, Castle Road: Red letter box with GR Royal cypher, dating back to the period of his reign 1910-1936	4/6
4	The Old County Police House, Westbury Road: Brick-built in 1939 to house the Village 'bobby'	2/5

1	Mediaeval Moated Site, Trowbridge Road: Constructed circa 1300 to protect the home of the Lord of the Manor.	Scheduled 1019735
2	The Court House, 26 Court Lane: Half-timbered thatched former manorial court house with parts dating back to 15 th Century	GRADE II* 1193662
3	Granary, 26 Court Lane: Listed Thatched granary on saddle stones	1036515
4	Finger Post, Court Lane: Wooden three-way direction signpost, with considerable rustic charm, outside The Court House	4/6
5	Grange Farm, Lower Road: Former farmhouse, built circa 18 th Century	GRADE II 1036518
6	Court Farm House, 22 Court Lane: Former farmhouse, circa 16 th Century	GRADE II 1036519
7	Rosenheim Farm with Railings, Lower Westbury Road: Late-17 th Century former farmhouse	GRADE II 1193785
8	Rose Cottage, Lower Westbury Road: This picturesque cottage, built circa 1725, was once known as Elm View.	3/6
9	Victoria Terrace, 16, 18 & 20 Court Lane: his group of picturesque brick-built Victorian cottages have significant townscape value.	4/5/6
10	Pear Tree Cottage, Court Lane: Cottage built circa 1700	GRADE II 1193651
11	St Anne's Cottage, Court Lane: Timber-framed cottage built circa mid-17 th Century	GRADE II 1036513
12	Court Lane Farmhouse, Court Lane: Former Farmhouse dating to mid-17 th Century	GRADE II 1036514
13	Dove Cottage, 1&2 Bury Lane: Mid-c. 16 th Century artisan's cottage	GRADE II 1036515
14	Ballards, Bury Lane: Late 18 th Century house	GRADE II 1364306
15	Scotts Farm, Bury Lane: Late-17 th Century Farmhouse	GRADE II 1036505
16	4&5, Bury Lane: These picturesque thatched cottages, with date plaque of 1798, have significant townscape value.	3/4/5/6
17	Yew Trees House, Lower Road: Listed Former School House circa 1689 owned by the Whittaker Family.	GRADE II 1036517
18	Whitakers, Lower Road: This particularly attractive building was originally the Milking Parlour for the adjacent Yew Tree Farm.	3/6
19	Yew Tree Farmhouse, Lower Road: Timber-framed former Dairy Farm circa 17 th Century.	GRADE II 1364271
20	Yew Tree Barn, 49 Lower Road: Late 17 th Century	1286044
21	Wooden Milk Churn Stand, Lower Road: Rare surviving reminder of the way milk was collected from the farms in the Village.	1/2/6
22	Ivy Cottage, Lower Road: Timber-framed, thatched cottage dating to circa 1520	GRADE II 1193776
23	Winters, Lower Road: Late 17 th Century	GRADE II 1364272
24	Ivydene, Lower Road: Former farm building circa 1713	GRADE II 1193770
25	East Marsh Farm, Lower Road: Former 17 th Century Farmhouse	GRADE II 1193692
26	Granary, East Marsh Farm, Lower Road: Wooden granary on saddle stones with considerable rustic charm.	1/2/6
27	Stink/Stench Pipe, on Footpath BRAT27: Manufactured in the early 20 th Century, to disperse gas and bad odours from underground sewers.	1/2/3/6

1	Church Gate Posts, Church Lane: An attractive pair of Gate Posts from Circa 1832 at the entrance to Church Lane	4/6
2	St James the Great, Church Lane: 13 th Century Parish Church	GRADE II* 1036509
3	Funeral Monuments, St James' Churchyard: Various funeral monuments dedicated to key figures in the history of the Village	GRADE II 1036510 1036511 1036512 1193619
4	Church Steps, Church Coombe: 208 stone steps were constructed in the circa 1855 to provide a pedestrian link across the coombe to the vicarage and the rest of the Village; have strong historic links and aesthetic value	4/6
5	Church Hill Cottage, Millditch: Attractive Victorian House overlooking St James' Church, thought to have been built circa 1855 for the Parish Clerk	3/6
6	Combe Cottage, Combe Lane: Attractive Victorian House overlooking St James's Church, thought to have been built circa 1855 for the Parish Curate	6
7	World War II Graffiti, Coombe Farm Barn: Chalk messages inscribed by Land Girls staying in the barn at Coombe Farm during the war	1/6
8	Windygates, Port Way: Attractive example of Arts & Crafts building, circa 1910s	2/6
9	Summersdown House, Upper Garston Lane: Brick-built former Victorian Vicarage, built in 1863	2/6
10	The Oratory, Upper Garston Lane: Attractive brick-built former school house built in 1820 by the National Society	4/6
11	The Elms, Millditch: Attractive Edwardian House, with cast iron House Plaque by Reeves Ironworks on the gate; built circa 1900 by Henry Reeves for his son, Robert	2/3/6
12	Mulberry House, 10 The Butts: Georgian House, built circa 1835. Owned by the Reeves Family	GRADE II 1364307
13	The Coach House, 10a The Butts: Built in circa 1835 to serve (Grade II listed) Mulberry House	6
14	The Wilderness, The Butts: Built by Thomas Reeves circa 1850, this attractive Victorian house has a fine pair of stone gate posts, with a cast iron house plaque by Reeves Ironworks on the one to the left	2/3/6
